#### From the President

Once more I'm writing from afar. In order to fulfill my obligations and write my monthly passage for the *Bulletin*, I'm writing this in Nero's coffee shop on the front in Weymouth on the south coast of England. I've found this my most difficult assignment so far.

Sharyn and I have been in Paris over the past couple of weeks staying in a second floor flat, above a bakery on the Rue des Petits and close to the centre of the city. We were within comfortable walking distance of the Louvre, Notre Dame, The Pompidou Centre, the Metro, and, of course, many other cultural and historical attractions situated in central Paris.

The village atmosphere right outside our door here was our biggest surprise. The restaurants and sidewalk cafes, like elsewhere in Paris, were plentiful along with the local butcher, baker, fruiterer, fishmonger, boutiques and patisseries that create a village and social atmosphere that is very pleasant indeed. All this exists on a multiple scale in this city of eleven or twelve million people.

I suppose when we travel we tend to compare what's at home in our own neighbourhood. By way of comparison, Brisbane City Council's attempt at rejuvenating parts of Brisbane to help encourage more community and social cohesion has met only partial success. On my own side of town, Mt Gravatt Central, Stones Corner and possibly elsewhere have had street upgrades to try and encourage a feeling of belonging and community.

With the development of American style malls, I feel we've lost a lot more social cohesion than we've gained. Some of what I saw in Paris would have taken many of our older members back to their younger days in places like Stones Corner and Nundah before the malls took hold in Toombul, Garden City and Chermside.

Last Wednesday we moved on to London via that marvel of engineering and technology the Channel Tunnel, and the Eurostar where we entered the United Kingdom at the brand new station at St Pancras. We were in the tunnel for exactly twenty minutes.

To say London is anything less than a hive of frenetic activity at the moment is an understatement. Olympic excitement, building and activity is everywhere.

Wimbledon was on our agenda this time and was every bit as good as it appears on television. On previous visits we missed Kew Gardens (The Royal Botanical Gardens) but managed to fit it in on this occasion –

a full three hundred acres in London and the largest collection of plants in the world.

Last Wednesday we caught the train down to Weymouth on the English south coast. The town here is also caught up in Olympic hype as it is the site of the Olympic sailing events. We're here for the next two weeks.

Climate change is in the news over here too. We had a number of wet days while in Paris, it rained lightly in London over the week we were there, and it's pouring this morning in Weymouth. The previous week the United Kingdom recorded its wettest week since records were taken with some disastrous floods in the north of England. It seems climate change is not only taking its toll in Australia but having considerable impact here as well.

Again this month there's too much to see and report and too little time. Hope all is well at home in Brisbane. Regards to all at RGSQ.

### Lecture - Geography and Diplomacy

The Society is proud to be hosting His Excellency Mr Paul Madden, British High Commissioner to Australia, as the guest lecturer at our August meeting.

Mr Madden will talk about the links between geography and diplomacy. Drawing on his academic background as a geographer, and his quarter of a century of diplomatic postings, he will argue that geography remains a vital influence in the world of international relations in the 21st century. His speech will discuss the impacts of natural resource endowment; natural hazards and disasters; the relationship between history and geography; political units and boundaries; and the importance of place identity.

Paul Madden has been British High Commissioner to Australia since January 2011. Prior to this he was British High Commissioner in Singapore from February 2007.

A career diplomat, he was previously Managing Director at UK Trade and Investment (2004-2006), responsible for co-ordinating and implementing international trade development strategies to support companies across a wide range of business sectors.

As Assistant Director of Information at the Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO) from 2003 to 2004 he was responsible for public diplomacy policy, including managing the FCO funding of the BBC World Service, the British Council and the Chevening Scholarships programme. He led the team responsible for the award-winning UK pavilion at the Aichi Expo in Japan 2005.

He was Deputy High Commissioner in Singapore from 2000 to 2003 and has also served in Washington (1996-2000) and Tokyo (1988-92). From 1992 to 1996 he worked on EU enlargement and environmental issues at the FCO in London.

Before joining the FCO he worked at the Department of Trade and Industry (1980-87) on a range of industrial sectors and trade policy, including two years as a minister's Private Secretary.

Paul Madden has an MA in Economic Geography from Cambridge University, an MBA from Durham University, studied Japanese at London University's School of Oriental and African Studies, and is a Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society. His first book, Raffles: Lessons in Business Leadership, was published in 2003.

#### **Maritime Museum**

#### Hinze Dam & Numinbah

Members and friends are invited to join this day trip on Sunday 9 September, which includes a guided tour of Hinze Dam. Early birds could make a full day of it, taking in the Nerang River's source area at Natural Bridge, while others could opt for the core afternoon activities.

For early birds, gather at the beginning of the Natural Bridge walking track at 10.30am. The Natural Bridge walk takes about half an hour and is well worth seeing. Nearby, the Qld/NSW border gives brilliant views over the Tweed Valley towards Mt Warning.

There'll be plenty of time to get back to the Hinze Dam picnic area in time for lunch.

We'll gather from about noon for lunch. The meeting point is the picnic area below the Hinze Dam wall, down Hoop Pine Road. (Look for the magnetic RGSQ signs on vehicles.) BYO picnic or purchase from the kiosk at the top of the dam wall.

Our tour of the dam starts at 2.00pm with Michael Fiechtner of SEQ Water. After the tour, there's still plenty to take in – like a walk across the dam wall or through the adjoining park area.

To get to Numinbah/Hinze Dam, you take Exit 71 off the Pacific Highway at Nerang and turn right at the top of the exit ramp. Follow the signs indicating Murwillumbah or Numinbah Valley or Natural Bridge – (route 90, then route 97).

Hinze Dam turn-off is 10 km from Exit 71 where you left the motorway.

Natural Bridge is 29 km further on from the Hinze Dam turnoff through the beautiful Numinbah Valley.

Please register with the RGSQ office, including payment of a fee of \$5.00 per person. Bookings will close on 4 September at the latest, but the guided tour may reach capacity before then.

#### **Lambert Centre Trek 2013**



RGSQ is planning to revisit the

Lambert Centre to recognise the

25th anniversary of the erection of the

Flagpole by our Society in 1988.

**Itineraries** have been prepared for both **4WD** and **coach travellers**.

The **4WD Trek** will start at Broken Hill on 28 August 2013. Running for 23 days we will visit many iconic places in Central Australia, such as **Uluru**, **Kata Juta**, **Lake Eyre**, **Coober Pedy**, **Kings Canyon** and **Alice Springs**. Registration fee for **4WDs approx \$250 per vehicle** 

The Coach Trek will be of 16 days from Brisbane and returning to Brisbane, starting
 7 September 2013. The Coach will offer some accommodation options, such as cabins for about half the nights. The itinerary will visit many of the sites noted above.
 Cost is likely to be below \$3000 p/p.

The Lambert Centre is the Geographical Centre of Australia. It was determined at the request of the RGSQ in 1988, and named in honour of Dr Bruce P Lambert from the Division of National Mapping. The Lambert Centre is situated about 25 km west of Finke NT.

#### **AUSTRALIAN GEOGRAPHY COMPETITION**

The National Geographic Channel Australian Geography Competition Final for students under 16 years old was held in Sydney on 18 June. Eight students (six boys and two girls this year) represented their state or territory.

As part of their prizes the students won a weekend in Sydney. The programme included climbing the Sydney Harbour Bridge (surely the highpoint!), a behind-the-scenes tour with the reptiles at Taronga Zoo, and a performance in the Sydney Opera House of *Opera Warriors* by the visiting Shanxi Huajin Dance Art Troupe.

The Final was held at Foxtel Studios in Sydney. It was compered by ex-Temptation host Ed Phillips in front of an audience of students, teachers and other invited guests. National Geographic Channel later broadcast a one-hour programme on the Final.

The questions in the Final covered a large range of topics, including landforms, resources, demography and questions linked to the International Year of Sustainable Energy for All. The stimulus material included video footage, photos and maps.

- 2<sup>nd</sup> Sebastian Summersby-Mitchell, Canberra Grammar School
- 3<sup>rd</sup> Yianni Van Gelder, Newington College, Sydney

James won a place on the Australian team which will compete in the 2013 National Geographic World Championship in St Petersburg, Russia. The other team members will be the top intermediate student from 2013, and either Sebastian or next year's second-placed student.



#### **International Geog Olympiad**

The 2012 International Geography Olympiad will be held from 21 to 28 August in Cologne, Germany. The team is selected from students who have excelled in the senior level of the Australian Geography Competition, via a fieldwork-based selection/training event Geography's Big Week Out. These four students have been chosen based on their outstanding performances:

- Sarah Godman, Cootamundra High School
- Sarah Naco, Canberra Girls' Grammar School
- · Kate Parrott, Hobart College

The team will be accompanied by Society Administrator Kath Berg and Society Councillor Margaret McIvor. Kath is currently Secretary of the International Geographical Union Olympiad Task Force so will be at the Olympiad with two "hats" on.

Following the Olympiad, the Australian team will join some of the other teams for a short trip in Germany. This includes time in Heidelberg, Leipzig, Dresden and Berlin. However, being for geography students, it also includes: Neuseenland, where they are reclaiming old industrial and mining sites for recreation; the Saxon loess fields; the glacial series in Brandenburg; and the south German scarplands.

#### **Floodlines**

You might like to visit this multi-part exhibition at the State Library of Queensland, if you haven't yet been. It closes 19 August.

Through stories, exhibitions and events, Floodlines shares your contemporary and historical memories of Queensland's floods – making sense of the past and celebrating the spirit of recovery.

Floodlines: a living memory. As we recover, remember, reflect and rebuild, Floodlines: a living memory pays tribute to the resilience and community spirit of Queenslanders in the face of devastating natural disasters of the summer of 2010-11. Queenslanders — through film, sound, ideas and photos in the Flood and Cyclone Mosaic — help tell the rich and complex story of a summer we will never forget.

Download the Floodlines app for iPhone, iPad or iPod touch to see flood waters rise in 3D as part of the exhibition. Using augmented reality technology, the app allows you to simulate the rise and fall of the Brisbane River across the CBD and surrounding areas. [One of our members was really impressed with this app.]

Floodlines: 19th century Brisbane. Brisbane, the 'River City', has a long history of floods – and the 'great floods' of 1893 remain in our memory as a benchmark against which all subsequent floods have been
