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From the President

Writing as President of our Royal Geographical Society in the last two months has been something of an outline of my past activity and interests in geography and the Society – now some comment on more recent happenings.

Two Council meetings and the October and November Lectures have passed since the Annual General Meeting and Committee activity for 2013 is underway. For all my previous time with the Society, I have not fully appreciated the strength and extent of the Committee work within the Society, especially in the way that the current activities are enabled within the modest financial and people resources available. In the role of President, I have had to become more aware of the scope and time involved.

During October there have been two invitations from our Patron, Her Excellency Ms Penelope Wensley, for the Society to attend Receptions at Government House. The first was to a Reception with the Minister for Agriculture, the Honourable John McVeigh, to recognise and promote the importance of Agriculture in Queensland. The second in her

capacity as Patron of the National Trust of Queensland, to celebrate the first year anniversary of the Currumbin Wildlife Hospital Foundation and in support of the Currumbin Wildlife Sanctuary and Community Wildlife Hospital.

Each was attended by large number of representative from kindred organisations, businesses and Local Authorities. The very pleasing nature of these receptions was the exchange of information and the "networking" promoted by the Governor.

The first of these Receptions was attended by myself as President, my wife Kathryn (also a Member) and Mr Keith Smith, the Society Business Manager and now retired Secretary. The Governor and her Husband welcomed Guests at the entrance to the Drawing Room. In welcoming Keith Smith, as he entered, the Governor specially acknowledged his recent retirement as RGSQ Secretary after twenty six years, with a suitable comment.

The outline of the work, achievements and plans of the Agriculture Industry by Her Excellency was presented in her usual informed and erudite manner. The Minister for Agriculture, Hon John McVeigh responded with appreciation and the promise, maybe a little political, of the ongoing support of the Government for the farming community.

On the second occasion, Kathryn and I represented the Society. A completely different selection of

people, related to the National Trust responsibilities and the work of Currumbin Sanctuary was assembled.

It was most informative to hear of the work of the National Trust at Currumbin and to realise the scope of the public support required and given to this organisation.

The information about wildlife preservation, outlined by the Governor, and in the response to the Governor's address by the Chairman of the Fund Raising Committee, Dr Bruce Cook OAM, was a further example of valuable communication.

It is my impression that our mass media techniques for reporting, in print, radio and television, do not manage to present the essence of the real work of these types of organisations, in the manner achieved at these gatherings.

Thanks and appreciation to Her Excellency for recognising and including our Society at these functions.

Then travel via Moree (1 night) to Coonabarabran (2 nights) and visit the Warrumbungles and local Observatory.

Next to Armidale (3 nights), for waterfalls and national parks, art galleries, museums and a local tour.

Finally to Yamba (2 nights) for some beach, surf, and visits to nearby centres, such as a ferry trip to Iluka for lunch.

The formal Trek will finish at Yamba on 11 April, but people may elect to stay on, or visit other beachside places like Lennox Head on the way home.

The itinerary has been planned on good roads, and with caravan park/motel accommodation every night. Queensland/NT Border

Peter Saenger, who was one of the researchers at Pungalina, has published a book entitled Queensland's Western Afterthought, about the 1862 shift of Queensland's western boundary from 141°E to 138°E, from Haddon Corner to Poeppel Corner.

Peter is concerned that the important anniversary of this action – 150 years ago – has passed unnoticed in this State. Without this re-positioning of the boundary, our State's geography and economy would have been very different, with the Queensland towns of Birdsville, Bedourie, Boulia, Cloncurry, Camooweal, Mt Isa, Burketown and Karumba being situated in the Northern Territory!
