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#### From the President

I would like to thank our immediate Past President, David Carstens, for a job well done over the past two years. His efforts during his time in office has had a positive and enduring impact on the affairs of our Society.

Secondly, I would like to thank The Royal Geographical Society Council and you, the members of RGSQ for once again placing your trust in me as President for the coming year and congratulations are in order for our incoming Council and two new councillors, Roger Grimley and Bob Abnett.

Bernard is busy organising the 2015 Australian Geography Competition which is to take place in March and April next year. This year, 2014 four students performed extraordinarily well and achieved a second placing overall for Australia in the 2014 International Geography Olympiad in Krakow, Poland recently. Janice Mui, MacRoberston Girls' High School, Melbourne came third overall, and received a gold medal, Stephen Roche, Sydney Grammar School received a gold medal, Oscar Fawkes, Sydney Grammar School received a silver medal and Leon Shi, Melbourne High School received a bronze medal.

Changing tac to tours and activities, Kay Rees has just submitted a short report from the trekkers who have recently returned from Cape York which you can all see on the next page in this Bulletin.

This year the Cape York trek had 23 participants and 11 vehicles involved in this our major trek within Australia for 2014. In my long association with RGSQ this type of trek has never failed to interest would be trekkers from those RGSQ members recently retired and eager to indulge in a little not so soft adventure.

Corrugated roads and camping are the norm on these treks, and let's not forget there's always excitement when these trekkers view somewhere significant, this time Possession Island where, possibly our most famous English forebear, James Cook stood 200+ years previously. This spot and its significance is not without controversy, but still manages to conjure excitement, as did many of the other highlights such as Cooktown, Weipa, Merluna Station, and Heathlands Resources Reserve.

Liaison with kindred Societies in London, Hong Kong, and South Australia are firmly on the agenda over the next twelve months. Chris Spriggs has recently returned from a visit to The Royal Geographical Society premises in London. RGSQ look forward to further communication and co-operation Queensland and between the United Kingdom parent society.

Planning is quite advanced and 20 RGSQ members are off to Hong Kong in November, where we're to attend the annual dinner of the Royal Geographical Society of Hong Kong, an overseas branch of RGS London, while closer to home, our Tours and Activities committee are planning a trip to South Australia and RGSSA in Adelaide in the latter part of 2015. Kangaroo Island will be the main focus of this trek

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#### Lecture – Tues 7 October Dr Kerrie Wilson *Conserving biodiversity on a budget*

The world's largest conservation organisation has a total revenue that is less than 1/10 the net profit of Wal-Mart. While biodiversitv conservation is an important goal it must compete with other societal priorities. Conservation therefore requires an understanding of both the ecological and the socioeconomic system. I will describe new theory and methods for prioritising where, when, and how to invest funds for protecting biodiversity and ecosystem services and will illustrate with examples of the uptake of this research in Australia, Borneo and California.

Dr Kerrie Wilson holds a degree in Environmental Science from The University of Queensland (University Medallist) and a DPhil in ecology from the University of Melbourne (awarded in 2004). Kerrie is an ARC Future Fellow and has authored over 100 scientific publications (including publications in Science and Nature). As an Early Career Researcher. she is recognised as an emerging leader in conservation science, evidenced by being a recipient of an Australian Leadership Award, a European Erasmus Mundus Fellowship, SCOPUS Young Researcher Award, and a Eureka Prize for Outstanding Young Researcher. Dr Wilson has also previously held leadership positions with nongovernment organisations including Director of Conservation for The Nature Conservancy and currently services on the international advisory boards of the IUCN Save of Species Program, the Ecosystem Services Partnership and the QLD Government Biodiversity Research Partnerships Program. Her research into the socio-economic aspects of conservation involves collaborations with numerous government and non-government organisations.

#### **RGSQ Cape York Trek**

The Cape York Trek from 14 July to 10 Aug 2014 was extremely successful and enjoyed by all. There were 11 vehicles in the group with 23 participants.

The Trek began and ended at Mt Carbine covering approx 3,500 kms. Folk made their own way there and back by various routes which added another 4,500 km or more making it a long Trek. Roads were extremely rough in sections and better than expected in other places for instance Lakeland National Park and the road to Chilli Beach.

We had nine groups in tents, one off-road caravan & one VW Transporter camper van, the latter two having the advantage of not having to set-up but taking a little longer to travel on the corrugated roads. Setting up the tents so many times was a trial, but it was off-set by experiencing this amazing part of our country.

After all the rain that had fallen earlier in the year, we were fortunate enough to visit most of the areas on our agenda. The highlight was making it to the Tip and seeing it from 3 different perspectives - by land, by sea & by air in a small 4seater helicopter. An unplanned visit was to Possession Island where James Cook claimed the Eastern Coast of Australia and even though we didn't set foot on the island, it was very moving to view this auspicious place. Other highlights were a trip to Thursday & Horn Islands, a cruise on the Embley River as well as a tour of the vast bauxite mine at Weipa, a surprise birthday celebrations for Anne at Merluna Station & for Russell at Portland Roads, a guided tour of Aboriginal artworks at Laura. meeting the locals and birds, birds and more birds for the bird-lovers.

Our campsites were varied from caravan parks & national parks, to staying at the back of the local pubs. Probably the most memorable were our campsites at Merluna Bramwell Station Station. ጲ Heathlands Resources Reserve. Here we were able to experience life on the land in these remote areas & enjoy the hospitality of the hosts including three delightful children at Heathlands.

There were many places to visit of an historical nature. Cooktown where Capt Cook landed in 1770, Somerset where John Jardine established the first settlement on the Cape in the mid-1800s, Old Mapoon where a mission was set up in the late 1800s, Old Laura Homestead (from 1892), now heritage listed and in good condition due to volunteer participation, the old fort and cemetery on Thursday Island and the remains of aircraft & anti-aircraft batteries from WWII on Horn Island.

A month in this vast area only gave us a taste of what there is to see & experience. A memorable Trek!
