"Biosecurity Queensland"

presented by Dr Jim Thompson

Chief Biosecurity Officer, Biosecurity Queensland

Biosecurity continues to be a high priority issue for all countries. Australia has a unique advantage with its geographical location and its relative freedom from many pest and diseases. However increased global trade and passenger movement, climate changes and the emergence of previously unknown pests present an increasing risk to Australia's agriculture, the environment and our way of life. Queensland is now the frontline state in Australia for the emergence of many of these pests and diseases.

In this presentation, Jim will look at the biosecurity issues facing Queensland and Australia and reflect on the future roles of government, industry and the community in tackling these challenges.

Since 2011, Jim has led the State's efforts in the management of animal and plant pests and diseases, invasive species, animal welfare and agricultural chemical use. He is the Queensland Government's representative on the National Biosecurity Committee and chairs a number of national committees and boards, including the Taskforce implementing Intergovernmental Agreement on Biosecurity.

Jim worked in the New South Wales Department of Agriculture in the northern tablelands before coming to Queensland in 1992. Jim has worked in various government agencies in Queensland (in several areas, including agriculture, natural resources and mines, and the environment) and in New South Wales in research, policy and management roles.

Jim Thompson obtained a B.Sc (Hons) in Zoology, a Master of Resource Science (pest animal management and control) and a PhD (animal management and conservation).

Jim has a strong commitment to deliver effective, customer focused biosecurity services for Queensland that are consistent with the national biosecurity framework.

Synopsis August Lecture: 'Cobb and Co comes to Queensland' presented by Jeff Powell

Despite the title of "Cobb and Co comes to Queensland" the interesting lecture presented by Jeff Powell at the August meeting was far more comprehensive. Jeff is the Curator of the Cobb and Co Branch of the Queensland Museum in Toowoomba. He is an enthusiastic and very well informed fount of information about the entire history of the network.

It began in Victoria in the mid-19th century when four young men saw the business opportunity the wealthy southern state offered. Freeman Cobb, John Murray Peck, James Scanlon, (note the spelling NOT Scanlan like our President) and James A Lambert were all in their twenties. Enthusiastic and energetic, they were capable of driving the coaches if the need arose. They had to gather huge resources as the teams of horses needed to be changed every couple of hours.

The network linked stables which also offered accommodation to the travelers. Though expensive, it was not a comfortable way to travel on rough roads which often barely existed. The passengers sat outside the mail coach and were exposed to the weather as well as the

The leather straps allowed a pitching motion which made me feel queasy as Jeff described it. On some routes, in some weather, rains made progress slow and muddy. The prevalence of bushrangers added to the risks faced by the mail coaches.

Most of Queensland's population lived on the coastal fringe but gold exploration opened up the interior, despite the rigorous conditions experienced by the Coach Company.

They also opened up in New Zealand which was considered more accessible than WA.

The lecture by Jeff Powell has stimulated my interest in returning to the Toowoomba Museum with more understanding of the importance played by the Cobb and Co network. I will pay particular attention to the suspension of the coaches now he has pointed out how uncomfortable they would have been to travel in/on.

It is 150 years since Cobb and Co came to Queensland so this was a most appropriate lecture to offer in 2016.

November Activity PUMICESTONE PASSAGE LARC EXCURSION

How about coming along for a great day out with RGSQ once again on November 2 for a unique look into Pumicestone Passage on the North Western side of Bribie Island.

This 2 hour excursion delves into the history, flora and fauna at the southern end of the Sunshine Coast. This part of the Pumicestone Passage abounds with over 350

species of migratory and regional birds, and varied marine life including the occasional dugong, dolphin and turtle.

All this from the deck of a living piece of history - the LARC V which was originally build in the 1960's. Other than the custom passenger deck, this LARC has been kept in the original condition as much as possible. This is a great opportunity to see a small part of the northern Pumicestone Passage from a different perspective.

This tour lasts approximately 2 hours. Cost for this excursion is \$75 payable to the RGSQ Office before the event. Numbers are limited. Bookings need to be finalised by Wednesday, the 19th of October, to facilitate numbers for the tour.

The LARC operators have promised this eco excursion will be slightly different to the one presented last year.

This tour will finish at the Caloundra Power Boat Club where we have organised lunch (12:30 pm), included in the cost of the activity. The lunch menu at the Power Boat Club is a choice of Roast of the Day or Crumbed Fish, chips, and salad, followed by Pavlova and Fruit Salad. Tea and coffee is an extra at your own expense.

At the completion of lunch at 2pm we will be ferried by the Power Boat Club Courtesy Bus to our car park in Short Street.

At 2:30 pm I have organised a further tour in Caloundra at the Queensland Air Museum, 7 Pathfinder Drive Caloundra West. This tour will cost an extra \$10 and is not included in the overall cost. The tour will last approximately one hour. However I do need definitive numbers to proceed with the last part of this excursion.

This promises to be quite an eye opener as this Aircraft Museum is now the largest of its type in Australia and has 70 aircraft on display.

CAIRNS, NEW GUINEA, and THE CORAL SEA

In 2017 it is our intention to spend 5 days in Cairns and its hinterland, and then link up with Coral Expeditions on the 4th of October for a twelve night cruise from Cairns to Rabaul in Papua New Guinea. While not exclusively ours, the cruise on the Coral Expeditions small ship, the *Coral Discoverer*, does provide Guest Lecturers and Expedition Leaders which fits quite nicely with The Royal Geographical Society of Queensland's mission of promoting 'Geography on the Ground' to our members. To borrow words from the Coral Expeditions website 'Mysterious Papua New Guinea' is right on the doorstep of North Queensland and, yet, most of us know very little about this land of the unexpected.

RGSQ have managed to secure a group booking for 10 people in June 2016 and if you were pondering joining the group on the PNG and the Coral Sea cruise in 2017 there were some 13 cabins available in the Promenade Deck Category A Stateroom.

The cabin costs per person include all meals and have been sourced from the Coral Expeditions website. Please be advised that the actual cost may vary at the time of booking. Promenade Deck (Category A) was \$11,550 (13 cabins). The number of cabins indicated in brackets was correct as at 8 August 2016.

If you are interested in this exciting combination which covers Cairns, Papua New Guinea and The Coral Sea please contact the RGSQ Office on 07 3368 2066.



While the final cruise itinerary would be up to Coral Expeditions, it is expected that we would sail Cairns to Alatau and then sail east to the Dobu and the Fergusson Islands, then north east to the Trobriand Islands, before turning north west again towards Lababia, Tuam, and Madang.

Having a shallower draft than larger ships, the *Coral Discoverer* would then enter the Sepik River and cruise to the middle Sepik region. Our ship would then turn east towards Crown Island, Kimbe Bay, New Britain, and finish in Simpson Harbour in Rabaul. We would then return to Cairns via a charter flight from Rabaul.

Please note that the RGSQ Cairns component of this trip, transport costs from your home to Cairns, and the return charter flight from Rabaul to Cairns at the end of the cruise are not included in the cruise cost listed above.

The details including the cost of the 5 days Cairns and hinterland leg of this trek will be provided in the coming months. This part of the trek may be booked by members who are not travelling on the cruise as well.

Australia wins Geography Gold at the International Geography Olympiad

Four young Australian geography students have come FIRST at the 13th International Geography Olympiad held in Beijing from Wednesday 17th to Sunday 21st of August.

The four-member Australian team and their achievements are:

Clair Yung, Narrabundah College, ACT - Gold medal and overall second in the world;

Andreas Orsmond, Sydney Grammar School, NSW - Gold medal and overall fifth in the world;

Deepan Kumar, Narrabundah College, ACT - Silver medal;

Georgia Worner, Loreto College – Kirribilli, NSW - Bronze medal.

The four-member Australian Team which compete at the International Geography Olympiad is selected from participants in the previous year's Geography's Big Week Out. Sixteen top performing Year 11 geography students, one female and one male from each Australian State and combined Territories who have taken part in the Australian Geography Competition are invited to participate in the Geography's Big Week Out.
